State of Missouri
Mauroe County
On the third day of June in the year
1833 Personally appeared before Edward J. Morgan
Sesus Beards and Felix Clark Judges of the County
Commissioners Court of Mauroe County now sitting
Andrew Hutton, a resident of said County of the age of
said - aged seventy six years, who being first duly sworn
according to Law doth on his oath make the following
deklaration: in order to obtain the benefit of the provision
made by the Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 -
That he volunteered ^{in person} in Captain Mills Company
of Colo. Howshing. Regiment of Maryland Militia in
Charles County - in May or June (this year he cannot
recollect) - and rendezvoused at an Old Catholic Church
called Chriseens Church & marched down the River
Pocomo to its Junction with the Potomac where
the Enemy's Ships were lying & were expected to Land
their forces but they did not Land except on Blackwater
Islands where they burnt some dwellings & carried
off the stock - after the Enemy left the neighborhood I was
discharged at Sewellery - ware house in the fall
of the year - The year following I volunteered in Captain
Henry Bowmans Company and Mustered into service
his Company consisted of one Lieutenant, Thomas Dixon
1st Ensign, Matthew Henson & about 60 Men Com-
misioned Officers & Privates - of Colo. Howshing Regt.
and served in his Company ^{Three Months} and
received a discharge signed by Captain Bowman
soon after the surrender of Cornwallis's Army -
at one Parson Prowings Old Fields as it was called

our Muster Grounds. - I also recd. Pay with my discharge in Paper for Charles County State of Maryland.

1st Where and in what year were you born?

Ans. I was born in Maryland Charles County in the year 1755 to the best of my knowledge

2nd Have you any records of your age and if so how, where is it. I have none that I know of

3rd Where were you being when called into service where have you lived since the revolutionary War and where do you now live

Ans. I was living in Charles County Maryland when I was called into service and remained there 4 or 5 Years afterwards - When I removed to Rowan County North Carolina & there remained 17 - Years & moved to Warren County Kentucky & afterwards to Washington County - and from there to this County where I have lived mostly for the last 18 Years

4th How were you called into service, were you drafted, did you volunteer or was you a substitute. If a substitute for whom say I, volunteer

5th State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the Troop where you served such as Captains & Militia Regiments as you

can recollect of the general circumstances of your service. - There was no Regular Officers that I was acquainted with in Command at the time I was in service and I was in no other Regiment but Col. Hawkins - of whose duty it was made to guard the East side of the O. Com. River - during the time I was engaged in no other pursuit. during the time I was in service

Having left a farm of thereby lost the whole season
 did you ever receive a discharge from the service and
 if so by whom was it given and what has become of it
 — ~~Ans.~~ I did receive a discharge for each tour of
 duty. The first from Captain Charles Milby —
 the second signed by Captain Henry Brown —
 He has no documentary evidence ~~in his possession~~
 of no person whose testimony he can procure who can
 testify to his service. He hereby relinquishes every
 claim whatever to a pension or annuity except
 the present and he declares his name is not on any
 pension roll of any Agency in any State
